4th Street and Montano Area Improvements Corridor Master Plan Stakeholder Workshop Summary August 12-13, 2008

The values and issues identified by the public and the information derived from focus group and individual stakeholder meetings and interviews will help to guide the process for the 4th Street Corridor Master Plan. Although the issues presented below will not be the only areas explored in the Plan process, they represent some of the critical points made throughout the course of the interviews and discussions held in August.

Values/Issues Exercise August 13th, 2008; 6:30 PM

Aerial maps of the study area were provided at each table, and three post-it notes were given to each participant to list the top three elements they value most or consider an issue regarding 4th Street. Each person then posted their values/issues on the wall. The project team identified common themes or categories and organized the values and/or issues under each, where appropriate.



The categories were identified and also the number of post-it notes under each category is as follows in order of magnitude:

- Ditches, Laterals, Acequias: 12
- Shopping, Commercial Character: 11
- Restaurants: 9
- Sense of Place (Community, Neighborhood Identity, Valley Identity): 8
- Open Space: 8
- Rural Atmosphere: 8
- Trees, Landscape: 8
- Street Lanes, Traffic Signals, Traffic: 7
- Architecture: 7
- Character, Diversity: 7
- Walkability: 5History: 3Transit: 2
- Police Station: 1
- Environment (Noise, Pollution, Light): 1



Best of/Worst of 4th Street Corridor Exercise August 13th, 2008; 6:30 PM

Using the aerial maps from the previous exercise, the participants were each given three red and three green sticky dots to identify their individual opinions of the best and worst elements of 4th Street on the map. Each table designated a team spokesperson who subsequently reported back to the general group the results from their respective tables. Participants were able to write on the maps to qualify or characterize a particular issue if desired.
